Please don't cut stanzas from hymns.

a concern, there may be other places where we can trim out a few minutes. If length is not a consideration, I can also point you to stanzas omitted from our hymnals that fill out the hymn's story and suggest ways we might include those.

Ask me to help with Christian education.

I know a lot about what we sing and why, and I would enjoy sharing some of that with congregation members. I can talk about our hymnal and its history; how to use the hymnal and all that it contains; the importance of congregational song; or how it is that when we sing, we pray twice.

This can be a refreshing perspective on God's word, especially if the hymn you choose is the hymn of the day. Imagine how much richer the experience of singing will then be. Ask me for ideas as we do our worship planning. I can also point you to helpful resources.
