Her organ, piano, vocal, choral, and liturgical music has been published by Augsburg, Hope, Concordia, Morningstar, Northwestern, and Choristers Guild. Her devotional writing has appeared in *Bread for the Day, Christ in Our Home*, and *The Word in Season*.

Nancy has been a featured speaker at theology and worship conferences at Valparaiso University, Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Concordia University Chicago, and Shenandoah University, and for ELCA's Southern Ohio Synod and South-Central Synod of Wisconsin. She was the founding editor of *In Tempo*, a publication of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians devoted to the practice of church music.

Prior to her service to the church, Nancy was a classical music critic for daily newspapers in Boston, Milwaukee, and Birmingham. Her articles on music have appeared in *The New York Times* and other national publications, and her monthly column "Faith and Culture" ran in the *Beloit Daily News*.

Nancy parents were Charles and Mary Miller. Her husband William is an author and retired business professor. Their adult children are Margaret, a graduate of the College of Wooster and The Ohio State University, and Martin, a graduate of St. Olaf College. Margaret and Martin reside in Philadelphia and Minneapolis, respectively.

Nancy has been called by Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Marshall, Wisconsin, and begins serving there tomorrow.



The assembly stands. The candidate for ordination gathers with presenters and participating ministers before the assembly.

The ordinand is presented to the presiding minister and to the assembly.

I present for ordination to the ministry of word and sacrament Nancy Elizabeth Miller Raabe, who has been prepared, examined, and approved for this ministry, and who has been called by the church to this ministry through Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Marshall, Wisconsin. **Thanks be to God.**

The presenters move aside, and the assembly is seated.

Address and Questions

The presiding minister addresses the ordinand.

All baptized Christians are called to share in Christ's ministry of love and service in the world, to the glory of God and for the sake of the human family and the whole creation. According to apostolic usage you are now to be entrusted with the office of word and sacrament in the one holy catholic church by the laying on of hands and by prayer.

We praise you that, having ascended into heaven, Christ pours out his gifts abundantly on the church, making some apostles, some prophets, some pastors and teachers, to equip your people for their work of ministry for building up the body of Christ.

The presiding minister lays both hands on the head of the ordinand. Other ordained pastors who are participating in the laying on of hands place one hand on the ordinand.

Following a time of silent prayer, the presiding minister continues, praying for the ordinand.

Eternal God, through your Son, Jesus Christ,

pour out your Holy Spirit upon Nancy

and fill her with the gifts of grace for the ministry of word and sacrament.

Bless her proclamation of your word and administration of your sacraments,

so that your church may be gathered for praise and strengthened for service.

Make her a faithful pastor, patient teacher, and wise counselor.

Grant that in all things she may serve without reproach,

that your people may be renewed and your name be glorified in the church;

through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord,

who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

The assembly is seated.

Giving of a Stole

The ordinand remains kneeling. A stole is placed over the ordinand's shoulders.

Receive this stole as a sign of your work, and live in obedience to the Lord Jesus, serving his people and remembering his promise: "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30)

Charge

The ordinand stands. The following scripture passages are addressed to the ordinand.

hear our prayer.

For Nancy's family, that they support and participate in Nancy's vocation, and that they be strengthened in their own forms of ministry: God of mercy,

hear our prayer.

For the glorious company of all the saints, those who have died in faith and those who live in certain hope, we praise you. That their witness may give us courage until the day of Jesus Christ: God of mercy, hear our prayer.

The presiding minister concludes the prayers.

Into your hands, gracious God, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in your mercy; through Jesus Christ, our Savior. **Amen.**

The ordinand responds:

I will, and I ask God to help me.
