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#### **Composer Notes**

I am pleased to submit these materials for consideration for use at the 2018 Institute for Liturgical Studies. These pieces would be optional additions to the text as it exists in the various services, or as specific items to use where an "acclamation, psalm, or hymn may be sung."

These materials may be used however the baptism rite is performed. They are geared to a worshipping assembly that is likely to include the family and friends of the parents of the child (or the adult who is being baptized), some of whom may be invited to participate in the service music. A choir is present only occasionally. This means that the musical skills and experience of the assembly will, more than is typical, require musical materials that are straightforward, and that can be sung without a rehearsal. I have composed these materials with these conditions in mind.

I hope that these materials can assist in the appreciation of the assembly of the importance of baptism as part of the Church's expression of God's saving grace, and of the new life that comes to us each day through this sacrament.

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
